His large works for organ are considered an important part of the repertoire. Archer Alexander is known as the face of freedom on the Emancipation Memorial in Washington, D.C. He was also the subject of an 1885 biography, The Story of Archer Alexander, written by William Greenleaf Eliot. The biography tells the story of Alexander's escape from slavery and fight for freedom.
