Serving Us This Morning: Ushers:Kathy Wire and Lori Calcaterra Greeter: Cathy Rauch Flower Arrangement: Karen Albin AV Assistant: Greg Cotter Jean Langlais (1907–1991) was a French composer of modern classical music, organist, and <u>improviser</u>. His works are mostly masses and organ music, some based on Gregorian themes, enhanced by polymodal harmonies. Langlais became blind due to glaucoma when he was only two years old and was sent to the National Institute for Blind Children in Paris, where he began to study the organ, with André Marchal. From there, he progressed to the Paris Conservatoire, obtaining prizes in organ and composition. After graduating, he returned to the National Institute for Blind Children to teach, and also taught at the Schola Cantorumn, which he studied with Marcel Dupré, composition, which he studied with Paul Dukas It was as an organist, however, that Langlais made his name, following in the footsteps of César Franck and Tournemire as *organiste titulaire* at the Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris in 1945,

a post in which he remained until 1988.^[3] He was much in demand as a concert organist, and toured

widely across Europe and the United States.

Benedetto Giacomo Marcello 1686–1739) was an Italian composer, writer, advocate, magistrate, and teacher. Marcello composed a variety of music including considerable church music, <u>oratorios</u>, hundreds of solo cantatas, duets, sonatas, concertos and sinfonias. • History's only Unitarian king, 21-year old Sigismund, opened a debate to decide the relative merits of the faiths competing for dominance in the country.

- Francis David, formerly a Catholic monk who had studied in Wittenberg in the time of Martin Luther, converted to Lutheranism, then Calvinism, and ultimately adopted anti-Trinitarian beliefs.
- Frances David helped convert King Sigismund and most of the population of Kolozsvár, Transylvania's capital, to Unitarianism before being imprisoned and martyred by the subsequent ruler of Transylvania.
- In an era of bloody religious strife, Transylvania's King Sigismund, rather than banish competing faiths, proclaimed by the Edict of Torda in 1568 that the four competing Christian faiths Catholicism, Lutheranism, Calvinism and Unitarianism would all be tolerated.
