SouthSide Early Education Center

The mission of the Southside Early Childhood Center is to create lasting opportunity in the lives of children and their families. In 1886, a group of women created SEEC to ease the burden of childcare for immigrant families. Today, that historic organization is called SouthSide Early Childhood Center. It is an invaluable resource for St Louis City children and their parents offering quality education and enrichment opportunities to a diverse group of children across socio-economic, racial and cultural backgrounds. Gateway 180

Gateway 180 is Missouri's largest residential shelter for families and single women. Its programming includes shelter and rapid re-housing services along with educational programming, supportive casework, counseling

referral, help with basic necessities in achieving housing, and various child-focused programming, including tutoring and summer camp. It currently shelters 100 women, children and family members, down from its pre-COVID count of 150. Nominated by Rosemary Lawton
