Gateway 180

Gateway 180 is Missouri's largest residential shelter for families and single women. Its programming includes shelter and rapid re-housing services along with educational programming, supportive casework, counseling referral, help with basic necessities in achieving housing, and various child-focused programming, including tutoring and summer camp. It currently shelters 100 women, children and family members, down from its pre-COVID count of 150. Nominated by Rosemary Lawton

First Unitarian Church of St. Louis Policy Board Meeting Summary 12 December 2022 via Zoom

Supporting the Gospel Music Hall of Fame

Rev. Kim presented a letter, which we were asked to sign, that supports the conversion of the Second Baptist Church on 500 N Kingshighway Boulevard into a Gospel Music Hall of Fame. Rev. Kim noted that the Romanesque building is architecturally and historically significant, and if left unoccupied it will continue to deteriorate. Alison moved to sign the letter of endorsement. Erin seconded. Motion passed.

Board committees (Ministry, Personnel, Nominations) update

<u>The Personnel and Nominations Committees</u> did not meet since the last Board meeting. Although the Committee on Ministry did meet, Susan could not comment on their work since they are currently involved with Rev. Kim's review. She did, however, report that she attended a Webinar with Interfaith Power and Light. She summarized the webinar as follows:

"The Inflation Reduction Act makes funding for energy conservation available to Houses of Worship for the first time. It will be several years before details are worked out. In the meantime congregations should get ready. A start up kit is available for downloading at the Cool Congregations website. We should learn about cost effective strategies by forming a green team (the facilities committee is the obvious one). Next we should do an energy audit to develop a baseline and plan. We should encourage members to take similar measure at their homes. There are existing sources of funding by utilities and other congregations. One example is a challenge grant from Cool Congregations."

Exercise in defining our Values

Rev. Kim prompted meeting attendees to list things or qualities that are important to us ("ones that we would publicly proclaim") and/or that we perceive to be important to our congregation, which she then jotted down on a virtual white board. The final list included: tolerance, tradition, spirituality, community, justice, inclusivity, compassion, kindness, integrity, diversity, open-mindedness, love, progressive, free-thinking, learning, education, intellectual, careful, cautious, charity, outward looking, balance, inward focused, ecumenical, interfaith, Welcoming Congregation, Green Sanctuary, formality, comfort, structure, flexibility, collaborative, anti-authoritarian, musicality, participation, democratic process, engagement, non-dogmatic, non-creedal, covenantal, faith, search for meaning, creativity, generous, and stingy.

Rev. Kim then asked participants to select their "top three" priorities from the list that we generated. There was a lot of overlap. Justice was mentioned most often (7 responses), followed by community (5 responses). Two participants mentioned faith; tolerance, compassion, kindness, intellectual, non-creedal, and formality received one mention each.

<u>Church maintenance issues:</u> The roof, gutters, walls, and other structural concerns

Steve ended the meeting with a discussion of the maintenance needs of our church building. For example, the roof of the RE wing (constructed in the 1950s) and gutters need repairs. A wall is taking on water. In sum, the necessary repairs will total in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. In the future, a major task for the Board will be to determine how we will pay for this maintenance. Possible options include taking out a mortgage, tapping the General Fund and/or our investments, and/or launching a capital campaign as we did to build Hope Chapel.
