#### **MUSIC NOTE**

Alice Yost Jordan, 1916-2012, pursued graduate studies at Drake, Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary. Drake honored her during their centennial year as "One in a Hundred." Grand View University, in 1986, conferred the honorary degree, Doctor of Letters upon her, and in 2006 Drake bestowed the honorary degree Doctor of Fine Arts. Mrs. Jordan was listed in the first edition of Who's Who in American Women, and in Women in American Music.

She was inducted into the Iowa Women's Hall of Fame in 2002. A widely-known composer, she was best known for more than 250 published choral and organ works and one of her best-known arrangements, "America the Beautiful,"was sung many times by the Iowa All-state Chorus. Sherrill Milnes of Metropolitan Opera fame, and Jon Spong, his accompanist, chose her "Take Joy Home", as a closing work on many of their world-wide concerts, including a White House Concert. Over 40 of her works had been commissioned by churches, universities and other organizations across the United States.

**Louis-Nicolas Clérambault** 1676–1749) was a French musician, best known as an organist and composer. He began as the organist at the church of the Grands-Augustin's and entered the service of Madame de Maintenon. After the death of Louis XIV and Guillaume-Gabriel Nivers, he succeeded the latter at the organ of the church of Saint-Sulpice and the royal house of Saint-Cyr, an institution for young girls from the poor nobility. In 1719 he succeeded his teacher André Raison at the organs of the church of the Grands-Jacobins.

**Shirley Ann Caesar-Williams** (1938 - ), is an American gospel singer. Her career began in 1951, when she signed to Federal Records at the age of 12. Throughout her seven decade career, Caesar has often been referred to as the "First Lady of Gospel Music", and "The Queen of Gospel Music".<sup>[3]</sup> Additionally, she has won eleven Grammy Awards, fifteen Dove Awards, and fourteen Stellar Awards. Caesar has released over forty albums. She has participated in over 16 compilations and three gospel musicals. She has sold 2.2 million albums since 1991.

#### Minister's Column - Generosity

Confession time. When I first saw the proposed Article II values, I wasn't sure I liked them. Initially, all I received was the diagram and I immediately thought, "How am I going to explain that?" Then when I read the full report and understood the new Article II to be an articulation of our values, I really got on board. Just as we had a discussion in January about the values of First Unitarian STL, this is a statement of our explicit values as Unitarian Universalists. LOVE it.

I could write a whole piece on each value, but the one that is timely is Generosity. Here is how Generosity is explained as a value in the Article II Study Commission report: "Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope. We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality."

Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality. If that's not a definition of church, then I'm in the wrong field. I remember during the pandemic when neighbors checked on each other, when friends ran errands for folks with COVID, when membership called each person in the congregation. We realized in those first months that we needed each other - that it was only by our communal efforts to keep each other safe that we would make it through. That is interdependence.

I see it here at church all the time. The same people who provide rides to appointments one month need a ride the next month. We may assist with a memorial service reception one year and need help for a memorial service reception the next year. Interdependence is both giving and receiving - it is a relationship of reciprocity. When our efforts support our common thriving, then we are in a relationship of mutuality. Where and how are you sustained by First Unitarian? Where and how are you sustaining the church? How are we thriving together? When we build systems of reciprocity and mutuality we are living into our UU value of generosity. During this pledge Canvass, you're invited to consider the ways in which you give and receive here at First Unitarian and how we live into a UU value of Generosity together.

#### President's Column- Building Update

Back in May when I was elected President, I announced our yearly focus was renewal. I had imagined our focus would be renewal in a spiritual, emotional sense. Real life issues made it clear that the physical church building is now also a primary concern.

As many of you know, the flat roof in our RE wing has been failing for quite some time. It is now more than 40 years old and well past his expected life span. The Facilities committee spent the year investigating the best way to resolve our roofing issues. With the approval of the Board, they had experts examine the roof to come up with a solution. It became clear the roof needed to be replaced. With the blessing of the Board, Facilities obtained several bids to repair or replace the roof. After thorough discussion, Facilities recommended we replace the roof so that it would not be an ongoing problem.

This past Monday, March 13, the board unanimously approved a contract with Bartch Roofing, a well respected contractor specializing in commercial roofs. (Please click here to read references for Bartch Roofing). I signed the contract March 14, and we will learn soon when our church will get on their schedule.

The Board held a lengthy discussion on the right course of action. Ultimately, the Board felt comfortable approving the bid because it was approved both by the Facilities and Finance Committees.

The bid we approved was for \$95,000, which is a significant amount of money. Now that the contract has been signed, we as a congregation need to decide how to fulfill our duties under the contract. Put another way, we need to determine how we should pay for the new roof.

In our discussions with the Finance Committee, we determined we had three choices:

- \* Obtain a loan from a bank at a time when interest rates are high and unattractive
- \* Take the money from the general fund and deplete it to a dangerous level
- \* Take the money from the Endowment

While none of the options are easy, it is the Board and Finance Committee's recommendation to take the money from the Endowment. Our bylaws require us to have a Congregational vote to take such a large amount from the endowment. So now I am calling on our members to help finish the job.

Rev. Kim, the Board, Finance, and Facilities are planning informational meetings in the weeks ahead to explain the issue and our actions. We hope to answer many questions and take comments from our members. We will have a meeting March 26 after church (in person and online), and a virtual meeting April 2, 2023 at 6:00 pm. Our plan is to call a congregational meeting on April 23, 2023 to vote on the issue of funding this project. Thank you all!
