Minister's Column - Generosity

Confession time. When I first saw the proposed Article II values, I wasn't sure I liked them. Initially, all I received was the diagram and I immediately thought, "How am I going to explain that?" Then when I read the full report and understood the new Article II to be an articulation of our values, I really got on board. Just as we had a discussion in January about the values of First Unitarian STL, this is a statement of our explicit values as Unitarian Universalists. LOVE it.

I could write a whole piece on each value, but the one that is timely is Generosity. Here is how Generosity is explained as a value in the Article II Study Commission report: "Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope. We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality."

Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality. If that's not a definition of church, then I'm in the wrong field. I remember during the pandemic when neighbors checked on each other, when friends ran errands for folks with COVID, when membership called each person in the congregation. We realized in those first months that we needed each other - that it was only by our communal efforts to keep each other safe that we would make it through. That is interdependence.

I see it here at church all the time. The same people who provide rides to appointments one month need a ride the next month. We may assist with a memorial service reception one year and need help for a memorial service reception the next year. Interdependence is both giving and receiving - it is a relationship of reciprocity. When our efforts support our common thriving, then we are in a relationship of mutuality.

Where and how are you sustained by First Unitarian? Where and how are you sustaining the church? How are we thriving together? When we build systems of reciprocity and mutuality we are living into our UU value of generosity. During this pledge Canvass, you're invited to consider the ways in which you give and receive here at First Unitarian and how we live into a UU value of Generosity together.

First Unitarian Church of St. Louis Policy Board Meeting Summary 13 March 2023 Virtual

RE Roof Repairs. President Steve Wilke summarized the roofing contract status and the Finance Committee's recommendations for funding options, which he has since outlined in an email sent to the congregation on Tuesday, March 21: https://www.firstuustlouis.org/sites/default/files/Building%20Update.pdf Time is of the essence: the longer we wait to act, the more damage will be done. Bartch can only guarantee its quote for a limited time; postponing the decision could cost us thousands more. Given these circumstances, the Board took the following action:

Norma Vogelweid motioned that we approve the Bartch Roofing bid, Susan Lammert seconded. Seven voted in favor, none opposed. **Motion passed.**

In order to pay for these repairs, the Finance Committee recommends that money be withdrawn from the Endowment to cover the cost, an action that requires congregational approval. Alison Lamothe motioned that we approve seeking congregational approval to take the necessary funds to pay for these repairs from our endowment, Norma seconded. Seven voted in favor, none opposed. **Motion passed.**

Board Training: Change is Hard, Even if it's the Promised Land

For this month's training we were asked to watched three videos with an optional fourth.

The first was *Rollercoaster of Change*, presented by Gil Rendle (2007). He reminds his audience that while growth might generate excitement, change always involves loss. This is why people resist it; there is comfort with the familiarity of how we are used to doing things.

He describes three stages of change: 1) letting go of the old; 2) a confusing, in-between time, and 3) beginning anew. This last stage is where proponents of change would like to begin!

A challenge for people in leadership is that usually we are ahead of other members of the congregation when it comes to change. Congregants might still be processing their difficult feelings while we might be embracing the changes we have proposed. They will need to be able to talk to us; we will need to listen to them. Eventually, however, the time comes for leaders to say, "let's go." This takes courage. Rendle described this as "the Exodus moment: you're leading members into a wilderness of the unknown and unfamiliar." Looking backward, Cathy recalled our church's long low moment after the departure of our long-term settled minister, associate minister and RE director. Looking forward, Rev. Kim would like to work on building congregational tolerance for future low moments on this rollercoaster.

The next video was *Adaptive vs. Technical Challenges: A Case Study*, by David Pyle (Leaderlab/UUA.org, 2018). Pyle described a technical problem as one that can be clearly defined and for which knowledge exists to fix it. A mixed problem is clearly defined but its solution may be harder to define, and may or may not be known. (Our need for roof repairs is a mixed problem: we know what the problems are, but we have had to decide how we will address it; with the help of the congregation, we will have to decide how we will finance the fixes we have just approved.) An adaptive problem is one whose definition is unclear and the solution is unknown; it requires solution by a learning community. Adaptive problems require the adaptation of human relationships, always a hard, messy process.

The third video was *Adaptive Leadership: 6 Key Concepts*, by Renee Ruchotzke. She defines these concepts as follows:

- 1) "Get on the balcony," in essence, get the big picture;
- 2) **Productive disequilibrium**. Ruchotzke believes that adaptive challenges are best addressed while we are in a space of "productive distress," which she places between un-challenging stability that doesn't call us to action and an overwhelmed state in which we cannot function. Within a congregation, good leadership can broaden our range of productive distress.
- 3) **Work avoidance**. If we treat an adaptive challenge like a technical challenge, there are many ways we can create busy work for ourselves that doesn't bring about an actual solution to our problem.
- 4) Giving the work back. Adaptive leadership and problem-solving require time, and struggle.
- 5) Regulating the heat. We need to give people time to talk in order to cool things down.
- 6) Powerful questions. The third video ended here; a fourth optional video explored this concept further.

New business

As noted in her Minister's Report, Rev. Kim is struggling to make it to Fellowship Hall on Sundays. By the time she leaves the receiving line after the service, there is nearly always a meeting to attend. This gives some members the impression that she is "too busy" to talk or meet with them. We brainstormed ways we could free up Rev. Kim to be more available during Fellowship and discussed the pros and cons of all these options. Eventually, it may be necessary to develop a policy that will allow Rev. Kim more opportunities to interact with church members during Fellowship while still allowing those groups who prefer to meet on Sundays to do so.

The next Policy Board meeting will be held Monday, April 11, at 6:30 pm via Zoom.

Basic Definitions About Gender Identity (from uua.org)

Biological Sex The biological attributes such as anatomy, chromosomes, and hormones that inform whether a person is male, female, or intersex.

Gender Identity An individual's internal sense of being a man, a woman, neither, both, and so on—it is one's inner sense of being and one's own understanding of how one relates to the gender binary.

Gender Expression This term refers to how a person expresses their gender identity: how a person manifests masculinity, femininity, both, or neither through appearance, behavior, dress, speech patterns, preferences, and more.

Gender Binary A system of classifying sex and gender into two distinct and disconnected forms—male/man/masculine and female/woman/feminine.

Sexual Orientation The gender of the people a person is attracted to. Gender and sexual orientation are often lumped together, but are distinct. Transgender individuals can be lesbian, gay, bisexual, queer, straight, or any other sexual orientation.

Nonbinary an umbrella term used by people who experience their gender identity and/or gender expression as falling outside the binary gender categories of "man" and "woman." Many nonbinary people also call themselves transgender and consider themselves part of the transgender community. Nonbinary is sometimes shortened to enby.

Transgender an umbrella term for someone whose gender identity, gender expression or behavior does not conform to that typically associated with the sex to which they were assigned at birth.

Agender is a term used to indicate not having a gender or a "lack of" a gender. Agender people see themselves as neither a man nor a woman, or both. They're gender-neutral and often are described as genderfree or genderless.

Cisgender A term to describe people whose gender identities, presentations, and behavior "match" (according to the gender binary) the sex they were assigned at birth. Cis is a prefix with roots that mean "on the same side."

Genderqueer / Third Gender / Gender Fluid Terms used by people who identify as being between and/or other than man or woman. They may feel they are neither, a little bit of both, or they may simply feel restricted by gender labels.

Gender Non-Conforming / Gender Variant General terms for people who transgress gender expectations in some way.

Intersex A general term used for a variety of genetic, hormonal, or anatomical conditions in which a person's reproductive or sexual anatomy doesn't seem to fit the typical definitions of female or male. When a child is born intersex, many doctors and parents attempt to "correct" the perceived problem with surgery, which often causes mental and physical difficulties later in life. Some intersex individuals identify as transgender or gender variant; others do not.

Questioning a term used by some people who are in the process of exploring their sexual orientation and/or gender identity.

Transition The complex process of authentically living into one's gender identity, often but not always including leaving behind one's assigned birth sex. A transition may include coming out to one's family, friends, and/or co-workers; changing one's name and/or gender markers on legal documents; hormone therapy; and/or possibly (though not always) some form of surgery.
