Designated Collections

Gateway 180

Gateway 180 is Missouri's largest emergency shelter for families and single women and an important member of St. Louis City's Continuum of Care to address homelessness. Gateway180's nurturing program includes more than shelter and warm meals. Their onsite Case Managers and Program Service Committee work to offer clients employment and education support, health and mental health services, housing navigation, empowerment classes and much more. The children temporarily living at Gateway180 are offered tutoring services and other confidence building activities such as Girl Scouts. Gateway180 currently shelters 110 women, children, and family members. This year (2023), Gateway

served over 445 individuals in shelter, including 244 children, successfully moving 295 individuals to their own home. Nominated by Rosemary Lawton.

Southside Early Childhood Center

The mission of the Southside Early Childhood Center is to create lasting opportunity in the lives of our children—and their families—by providing the best in early childhood education and support services. In 1886, a group of women created the first "day nursery," or child care center, west of the Mississippi River to ease the burden of childcare for immigrant families. Today, that historic organization is called SouthSide Early Childhood Center. It is an invaluable resource for St Louis City children and their parents offering quality education and enrichment opportunities to a diverse group of children across socio-economic, racial and cultural backgrounds.
