Music Notes

François Couperin (1668 –1733) was a French composer, organist and harpsichordist. He was known as *Couperin le Grand* ("Couperin the Great") to distinguish him from other members of the musically talented Couperin family. Only one collection of organ music by Couperin survives, the *Pièces d'orgue consistantes en deux messes* ("Pieces for Organ Consisting of Two Masses"), the first manuscript of which appeared around 1690.

Gimme Shelter: Understanding and Addressing Housing Insecurity in St. Louis and Beyond Thursdays (February 8, 15, 29 and March 14) 6:30-8:00 PM

Join us for a series of four discussion sessions (February 8, 15, 29 and March 14) to understand more deeply the scope of housing insecurity in our region, including its intersections with gender, race, and class; the barriers to change, from individual to system-level; and avenues for change, from policy to direct service. The first three sessions will be facilitated by speakers from a variety of the agencies in the St. Louis region addressing housing issues, with suggested reading and short videos made available to participants. Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Bylaws, Principles and Purposes, is the foundation for all the work of our UUA and its member congregations and covenanted communities. Most remember Article II as our 7 Principles and 6 Sources, which articulate our denominational agreements and name our spiritual and religious foundations. UUA Bylaws require that we revise Article II on a regular schedule. The 2023 proposed revision of Article II is a radical re-visioning that invites us into dialogue with one another about the values of our shared faith community. We are in a one year discernment period, after which delegates to General Assembly 2024 will vote to accept or reject the proposed Article II revision. Want to learn more? Interested in being a 2024 GA delegate? Wrestling with how this will shape the future of our faith communities? Join Rev. Kim for a four-session small group exploration of the proposed Article II.

This four-session program engages you in the Purposes, Values and Covenant, Inspiration, Inclusion and Freedom of belief of the proposed Article II which will be voted on at General Assembly 2024. Sessions are 90-minutes, every other Wednesday, February 7 & 21, March 6 & 20, online AND in-person. This is a covenant-based program that requires participants attend all four sessions. Democracy and Church Governance

Church governance at First Unitarian Church of St. Louis depends on your participation and involvement. One of the principles/values of Unitarian Universalism (stated in the Fifth Principle and in the Justice Value statement) is the use of (small "d") democratic processes in congregational governance. As we enter the US Presidential Election year it may be helpful to remember that the exercise of democracy occurs at all levels of civic life including this church, and one of the necessary elements of robust democratic governance is participation.

The congregation votes on the leadership of our church and all of the candidates are required to come from the congregation. People have to be members in good standing for at least one year to serve on the Board and at least three years to serve as President. We have leadership opportunities at all levels, from volunteering to be an usher, through being a committee chair or cluster coordinator, to serving as a Board Member or Officer.

The Nominations and Leadership Development Committee is in the process of identifying those who are willing to take their turns at leadership for the coming church year. Different offices have different terms of service. This year's slate is looking for individuals to fill one three-year terms for Outreach and Social Action Cluster Chair, several Policy Board positions and candidates to serve one year terms for Church Council Chair, Treasurer, President, and Vice-President.

Please seriously consider your ability to participate in our congregational governance. If you wish to volunteer, please contact Margaret Weck, chair of the NLDC. If you don't volunteer, you may still be approached by the NLDC and we hope you will seriously consider that ask when it is made. WE are the church.
