#### Music Notes

Ernest Richard Kroeger (1862 - 1934) Kroeger was appointed "Master of Programs" on the Bureau of Music of the St. Louis World's Fair (1904) giving him complete supervision of the musical programming at the fair. He invited the world's greatest organists to give recitals, planned a series of great orchestral and choral concerts and arranged for competitions in all forms for musical composition. Kroger held organist positions at several St. Louis area churches including Grace Episcopal, Trinity Episcopal, and Church of the Messiah (Unitarian), now named First Unitarian Church, where we are today

**Charles-Marie Jean Albert Widor** (1844–1937) Widor wrote music for a wide variety of instruments and ensembles and composed four operas and a ballet, but only his works for organ are played with any regularity today. These include: ten Organ Symphonies, three Symphonies for orchestra with organ, *Suite Latine, Trois Nouvelles Pièces*, and six arrangements of works by Bach under the title *Bach's* 

*Memento* (1925). The organ symphonies are his most significant contribution to the organ repertoire. Today's selection is from his fifth organ symphony, the famous toccata.
