Each year at First Unitarian we celebrate Thanksgiving with a bread communion. For a long time it was cornbread and cider - where our youngest UUs baked the bread. For two years during the pandemic when we did not gather for communal baking, members baked at home. It was a wonder to taste the variations of cornbread while sipping from our juice boxes. This year a new opportunity presents itself. In consultation with the RE program, we are once again inviting the whole congregation into the baking. We want you to bake a family bread (just one loaf/pan/batch) and bring it Sunday morning for bread communion. It can be cornbread. It can also be sourdough or challah or raisin bread. It can be Pillbury crescent rolls or homemade chapatis or corn tortillas. Whatever "bread" is traditional for your family during the holidays. I am making gluten free cranberry muffins because every year my mother makes cranberry muffins for Thanksgiving dinner. What will you make? And yes, we'll still have apple cider. For the partner church Sunday service November 16, we will be welcoming Dr. Lehel Molnar to our pulpit. He is currently the archivist in residence at the Unitarian Church Headquarters in Kolosvár, Transylvania. He has been conducting archiving work at the Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley, CA. He is an ordained Unitarian minister and received his Ph.D. from the University of Szeged in Hungary. He will present a review of his research after the service. He will be in St. Louis for several days. Let Kimberly Perry know if you would like to participate in his visit. Atomic Homefront Screening and Discussion Sponsored by the Environmental Justice Task Force November 14th (6:45 pm)

The City of St. Louis has a little known nuclear past as a uranium-processing center for the Atomic bomb. Government and corporate negligence led to the dumping of Manhattan Project uranium, thorium, and radium, thus contaminating North St. Louis suburbs, specifically in two communities: those nestled along Coldwater Creek – and in Bridgeton, Missouri adjacent to the West Lake-Bridgeton

landfill. Plan to attend a screening of the film and panel discussion. Donations accepted to support <u>Just</u> Moms STL.

The initial viewing, in the documentary series, on November 14, 2025 will include Karen Nickle and Dawn Chapman, and a panel of community environmental advocates, connected with the Just Moms-Saint Louis Organization. Their efforts to inform the community, encourage cooperation with other US community organizations, and legislators and State agencies, has been remarkably effective.

Explore some of the key ideas in Healing the Heart of Democracy by Parker Palmer, including the Five Habits of the Heart. As Parker J. Palmer writes, "When we choose to engage, not evade, the tension of our differences, we will become better equipped to participate in a government of, by, and for the people . . ." We can take an important step in that direction by using this book to frame and focus conversations about politics with family, friends, neighbors, colleagues, and others. in the course of these conversations, we will learn more about what it means:

- To listen to each other openly and without fear, learning how much we have in common despite our differences
- To deepen our empathy for the alien "other" as we enter imaginatively into the experiences of people whose lives are radically unlike our own
- To hold what we believe and know with conviction and be willing to listen openly to other viewpoints, changing our minds if needed
- To seek out facts and explanations whenever we find reason to doubt our own truth claims or the claims made by others, thus becoming better informed
- To probe, question, explore, and engage in dialogue, developing a fuller, more three-dimensional view of reality in the process

We will grow in our ability to deal with political conflict, holding that complex force field in ways that unite "We the People" and allow us to hold our leaders accountable to the common good.
