From the Ground Up: Notes from the 5/31/25 Facilities Retreat.

On Sat. May 31st members of the Facilities Cluster and the Stewardship Cluster met for about three hours to physically and virtually tour our buildings and grounds. We surveyed the status of various ongoing projects, assessed the new tornado-related damage, began the process of prioritizing needed repairs, and began thinking about strategies for paying for ongoing building maintenance and future improvements.

The good news is that damage to our campus from the May 16th Tornado was limited to the downed trees, 5 broken windows, several small holes in the flat roof of the RE wing, damage to the fence on

Kingshighway, and damaged slate roof tiles at the peak of the sanctuary roof. We were spared the worst of the storm, for which we can be grateful.

These storm-related projects now join the previous list of existing projects. The work on repair is being prioritized and scheduled with an eye toward putting the safety and health of people first. Tree debris removal is a first priority. [NOTE: as of 6/4/25 the large trees on Waterman Blvd. and the debris covering parking places on the S. side of the parking lot have been removed.] Next are more permanent patches for the Sanctuary roof, repair of the RE wing roof, and replacement of the glass panes in damaged windows.

Moving forward, the Church Council will be asked to provide guidance in prioritizing ongoing work within our current budget. The Policy Board and Stewardship Cluster will work on the development of a sustainable building fund and fundraising for large dollar projects.

Exciting volunteer opportunities with Children's Defense Fund (CDF) Freedom School this Summer!

This is a volunteer opportunity that fits perfectly with our congregation's lifelong history of supporting education and youth, as well as our mission and vision of becoming more involved with our community.

Beyond Housing coordinates 4 CDF Freedom Schools in St. Louis, for grades K-5. CDF Freedom Schools are an amazing summer experience for young scholars, focusing on literacy. The emphasis is on developing a love of reading while interweaving literacy with creating community, empowerment and social action. Children, parents, and staff are introduced to a superb collection of books that reinforce the CDF Freedom Schools' theme "I Can Make a Difference". This collection is part of an Integrated Reading Curriculum (IRC) in which books, activities, field trips, and games all relate to and reinforce each other. The literacy program and books, meals, afternoon activities, field trips and celebrations are all at no cost to students (called "scholars"). Literacy testing is done at the beginning and end of the program, and scholars frequently improve by as much as several reading levels. First Unitarian's Social Justice team is excited about the possibility of hosting a Freedom School ourselves next summer, and we need your help this summer to volunteer at one of the current sites! The site locations in need of volunteers are The Deaconess Foundation, The Legacy Foundation and Christ the King UCC. This year's session will be June 16-July 25.

There are many volunteer opportunities with a variety of time commitments – helping to serve breakfast or lunch, sitting and conversing with the kids during meals, reading aloud, assisting with or leading afternoon activities, and chaperoning field trips. We hope that you are as excited as we are about the opportunity to support children in this amazing literacy and empowerment program!

The Social Justice Committee is launching a task force to work on immigrants' rights.

In this time of stepped-up attacks on immigrants, particularly immigrants of color, our call to stand with people who are under attack is more important than ever. As these people have been singled out as scapegoats for the ills of America, the moral and ethical foundation of our own religious beliefs tell us we must help, shelter, and defend humans, from both the governmental and nongovernmental attacks they are experiencing.

The task force will work on education, social relief programs, collaborating with other existing organizations that are already doing this work, and where appropriate taking direct action.
