Three Josephs, Two King Herods and a Zebra: A Pageant Update

The Pageant is coming December 8th! If you come to church on Pageant Sunday, it may seem like the pageant just magically happens each year! If you are a parent, you know that each year the pageant requires heavy lifting (literally - that set is HEAVY) and many hours of labor to deliver. We have long traditions here at First Unitarian about what ages and grades play what roles and how Baby Jesus is picked. However, as we've adjusted to the present realities of our religious education program, we've found ourselves short on both the number of children needed, and the volunteers necessary to produce the pageant.

So, we are going to do something a little different this year. Rather than just have the children and youth perform, we want everyone involved - ALL AGES. We are doing an interactive, no rehearsal pageant, and will need volunteers of all ages. We're telling the same story we tell each year, we're simply adjusting the format. Anyone can participate! We will be asking for volunteers at the beginning of the service, and hope many of you will say yes. We're saying yes to all participants, so if we have four wise people instead of three, that's great. If there is a horse among the sheep in the manger, that's great. We will have props and costumes available for all the traditional roles, however, if there is a role you know you want to play, or an animal you want to be and you have the necessary costume items at home, feel free to come in costume!

And we still need our youth to read the beatitudes at the end, as is the tradition. If you have a youth willing to be a reader, please let Rev. Kim know.

We hope that you will attend on December 8th and be a part of a renewed First Unitarian tradition.

First Unitarian Church of St. Louis Policy Board Meeting Summary November 17, 2024 Virtual

Please join Board members after church for a small group discussion about your vision for First U's future. Only two dates are left: December 8, and December 15. For more details, see the church e-blasts. We need your vision to help us see our future.

Our canvass co-chair has moved out of town, so we need a new co-chair to serve with Erin Milligan. The Board seeks someone who can commit to two years, has a high profile among church members, and is a good speaker. Canvass starts March 1. Let President Chuck Eby know if you are interested.

The Board discussed formally requesting that the Facilities Committee obtain bids for an outside consultant to perform a building condition survey to assess the condition and repair needs of our site, building, and systems. We need to plan for the building's likely maintenance and repair costs to function as a church in the immediate, short-term, mid-term, and long-term. Chuck Eby will draft a written request for Board review.

The Board passed a motion recommending to the Finance Committee the need for a spring 2025 fundraising event to address an anticipated budget shortfall. We anticipate a \$15,000-\$20,000 deficit in

the church's 2024-2025 operating budget due to increased building premiums and the need for a building condition survey not included in the present budget.

The Board picked Saturday evening, February 1, as the date for the Mid-winter Meeting. Please mark your calendars!
