Healey Willan, (1880 –1968) was an Anglo-Canadian organist and composer. He composed more than 800 works including operas, symphonies, chamber music, a concerto, and pieces for band, orchestra, organ, and piano.

Gordon Young (1919 –1998) was an American organist and composer of both organ and choral works. Young received 18 consecutive composition annual awards from ASCAP. His published works total over 800, and a number of his church anthems such as his *Now Sing We Joyfully unto God*, and his organ compositions such as his *Prelude in Classic Style*, have become standard repertoire.

First Unitarian Church of St Louis Policy Board Meeting Summary October 9, 2023 Virtual

The Policy Board unanimously and enthusiastically approved member Kevin Kellogg's request to display a sign in support of the UAW strike against the Big 3 automakers. Kevin explained the historic significance of this strike which will likely set the pace for the American labor movement over the next decade. The union is asking the automakers who reported a 44% increase in corporate profits over the last four years to share with their workers. During the economic downturns in the 1980s, workers agreed to several wage and benefit concessions to help the companies stay afloat. Now workers are asking for their fair share during good times. Rev. Kim noted that the UUA 2017 Statement of Conscience on Escalating Economic Inequity (https://www.uua.org/action/statements/escalating-economic-inequity) supports worker protections and rights and worker organizing efforts. President Steve Wilke is writing an e-news story and fact sheet to share more information about the strike and the labor movement with the congregation.

The Policy Board also decided to sponsor a truck (with decorations and lots of treats) for the upcoming Metro UU Trunk or Treat in the church's parking lot on Saturday, October 21, 4:30-6:00 p.m. in the church parking lot. The Board looks forward to seeing the kids in costume and hearing lots of good jokes!

In other business the Policy Board continued to study, with Rev. Kim's guidance, the proposed revision of Article II of the UUA Bylaws, Principles, and Purposes, the covenant to which all UU congregations and communities pledge themselves when they become members of UUA. We did a close reading of the present text and the proposed revision. As Trustee Chris Kocher noted, "Much of the revision is a

rewording, it is not foreign or new." As Rev. Kim explained, "Some of the desire for a revision was to have more poetic and accessible language."
